Jimmy was red hot and on fire, and that was a picture of us. We had spent an amazing week in a fun and happy place, and we had really come to love the Lord, as well as our new friends and counselor! Many of us were ready to go home and tell our parents and friends all we had learned. But right now, our eyes were glued on Jimmy! But then dad showed us what Jimmy Coal looked like when he was out of the fire. He'd take his stick and just drag him out. Like, away from the heat. Away from the Source. Jimmy Coal's color became less bright. He was no longer hot. He got more and more dark. Just lifeless. But it was because he was away from light! And dad said we could easily become like him! Our lives just might not stay bright, because once we're home, we would be removed from all the love of our Christian friends and counselors, and perhaps we wouldn't even be able to go to church. We would gradually become cold to the stories of Jesus and indifferent to God's love. We would be as lifeless as Jimmy Coal! But when dad pushed Jimmy Coal back in the fire, guess what happened! He was revived and red hot once again. I can remember being so happy to see him back on fire again. It's where he belonged! We had tears in our eyes because we were happy to see him bright!

So, the little story of Jimmy Coal showed us something that we learned that week, and what we needed to keep doing. God was our Source, and any goodness in our lives was all wrapped up in Him! But we needed to make the effort to go to Him, ask Him to come into our heart and live forever, lean on Him when times were hard, and find friendships with others that loved Him. CAMP GILEAD HISTORY MUSEUM

One of the featured experiences of the 75th Anniversary Weekend was walking through the Camp Gilead History Museum.

It is often said that during a time of significant spiritual awakening in a person, the songs, smells, trinkets and friendships a person experiences are heightened and of extreme personal value. It can be years later that a person will come across something that reminds them of that time of intimacy in their relationship with the Lord and it will bring back those special moments as if they were yesterday.

For literally thousands of boys and girls over the years, summer camp at Gilead has been a place of spiritual awakening. It has been a place where God has drawn them to Himself in a special way, and confirming His intense love for them through interactions with camp counselors, camp speakers, Creation and through His Word.

Part of our 75th anniversary weekend involved putting together some of those mementoes, that campers from all eras would recognize and recall. The museum was located in the lower cabins 5, 6 and 7. Each room was dedicated to a theme; The First 25 years, The Next 25 years, and The Last 25 years.



FIRST 25 YEARS

While all of the rooms were filled with photos, there were some fun items of significance. In the First 25 years room, there was an old songbook made out of linoleum samples that had been donated, songs typed out and bound into a sturdy book that campers used as they sang along in chapel. A vintage photo book was also present, complete with photos that were taken during the week of camp, and developed by one of the staff members there, so that campers could go home with these tangible reminders of their week. Documents of business meetings, early camp visionary drawings, camp brochures and postcards also graced the museum tables of this first room.







NEXT 25 YEARS












The Next 25 Years room moved us into the 70's, 80's and early 90's. Pictures were now in color and the songbooks included Praise Books and overhead transparencies. There were vintage camper shirts, a 50th anniversary Golden Gala mug and whirligigs that maintenance man Bob Mehner had built to put around Gilead. Vintage staff shirts made into blankets were displayed along with staff memory booklets from as early as 1993.





PAST 25 YEARS







The Last 25 years room brought us from the 90's to the present. Team Champions pennants from every theme since 2001 filled the room with color, along with vibrant photos, photo books and t-shirt blankets made out of vintage staff shirts. Scrapbook style theme picture frames were displayed that included all camp pictures from every week of camp for each summer beginning in 1998. A stuffed mini dinosaur (1999 - In the Beginning Dino) sat proudly next to some branding irons from summer 1997's theme; Branded. A VHS tape that launched our Capital Campaign and the brochure that explained our desire to build a water system was also displayed. Camp curios, a dirtboard and other items from Pops Inn were also included.







As guests passed through each room you could hear "ooos" and "ahhhs" as items were recognized, photos were discovered of themselves and camp buddies, while the memories flooded back. Staff alumni led their children through, showing them where they were in a staff photo, and you could see in their eyes that it felt like just yesterday that these moments had taken place.

Why do we take such effort to recall the past and its history? Because it is through looking back that we can see the faithfulness of God, remember truths and experiences that the busyness of life may have allowed us to forget and to, ultimately, draw us closer to the Lord. For those that have spent a week or a summer at Gilead, there has been impact. It is our prayer that through their time looking back and remembering those moments, that God would continue to speak to them, draw them to Himself and lead them into a closer walk with Jesus. We know that God can use something as simple as a collectable mug, or a significant photo to revisit His holiness, faithfulness and goodness. May He continue to shine favor over the simple pleasures of a week of summer camp ... and all of the things that come with that experience.



It was special to remember Saturdays when the last busload of campers drove away and the camp staff would get to work cleaning bathrooms and sweeping cabins, scrubbing the kitchen and washing tables, restocking Pop's Inn, sweeping out the lodge and chapel, mowing and trimming, cleaning the horse barn, dumping trash.....when all the work was done the counselors and kitchen crew would all go into Redmond for a pizza party. It was hard work but such a special time together afterward!

I want to personally thank the whole Gilead staff and volunteers for the way you set up the camp to welcome us old timers back home. I don't know all the names of people involved in setting up this anniversary, but know Jack & Sara, Kim & Josh and their families and apprentices were great team leaders making this day so perfect. God has worked so many miracles in people's lives for years and it was so nice to come back and hear some stories of how God is still blessing Camp Gilead and the people that keep it going. Perhaps one day our grandchildren will get to create their own joyful memories of time as campers at Camp Gilead.

I know there are still things that need repair or replacing around the camp and challenge you to give your time, money, equipment and supplies to Camp Gilead to keep it moving forward for another 75 years.


