





WOMEN'S RETREAT RECAP










THE CAMP CABIN SERIES

Forrest Johnson, Gilead's first director & pastor of Tabernacle Baptist Church of Seattle, had a heart for missions. Each cabin was named for a country that had missionaries serving there. Many of those missionaries are now retired or with the Lord. We bring you the names of today's missionaries in those countries, and the ministries they are part of.

CABIN 1: TOGO

Cabin 1 was named Togo in the 1970's, honoring the ministry of Tim & Esther Neufeld, who served faithfully for many years in Togo, with ABWE, beginning in 1975. Though retired, they still maintain connections with the ministries, hospital and churches they were involved with.

The hospital provides quality compassionate healthcare in Jesus' name to a region of Africa that is primarily Muslim and unreached. The hospital provides a platform for sharing the gospel and planting churches. Ethan serves as the hospital's administrator and Melissa is a doctor who serves in the clinic and the hospital. They are also active on the church-planting team and weekends, many times, find them visiting patients and employee families. The Molsees serve on the Togo North Team of missionaries where there are always needs for short and long-term teammates. From schoolteachers and maintenance workers, to doctors and nurses, more workers are needed.


