As a 17-year-old growing up in Eastern Washington, I was 🖟 invited to go to a Christian camp for a week at the end of my junior year of high school. I was an obnoxious, mean, partying kid who heard that camp was a great place to meet girls, so I went. What happened in my first-ever camp experience changed my life.

In Christian camping, we often call the camp setting "temporary community," referring to campers leaving behind their daily routine, maybe most of the peer group and the pressures that accompany it, and stepping into a place free of those burdens and expectations. This freedom and the natural beauty of God's creation provides an ideal environment for young people to experience a stillness in their minds in which they can hear the voice of God saying, "I love you. And I made a way for us to be in relationship forever."

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U.S. Christian Camping Thriving

More than 40 years ago I responded to that invitation and gave my life to Christ at Malibu Club in Canada, a Young Life camp in British Columbia. And now, decades later, camp is still the best, most effective ministry I know of to present the Good News to people young and old.

So, you see, I'm not only the President/CEO of Christian Camp and Conference Association – the largest collective of Christian camps in the United States – with the mission of maximizing ministry for our more than 860 member organizations. More importantly, I am a product of the ministry of Christian camping.

Across the United States, Christian camping is still going strong in spite of two years of a global pandemic. And while one expert predicted that more than 480 of our members would close permanently due to COVID in that first year, only five camps closed their doors that year - which was slightly below the annual average of camp closures.

Time after time, I have heard stories of camp supporters, champions of their ministries, stepping up and providing the needed resources to keep operating even when they could not offer camps. Losses of hundreds of thousands of dollars at some camps have been made up by generous people who value the eternal impact of their favorite camp.

I believe God has uniquely prepared the ministry of Christian camps to meet the needs of kids and their families for such a time of this. The pandemic has put a punctuation mark on the need for connection, for time in nature, for self-discovery and, most significantly, to know there is a Creator who loves campers and wants to be in relationship with them. We're grateful for the ministry of Camp Gilead and the lives that have been changed on that sacred ground. Gilead is part of a global movement of God, and the work of the ministry is so important. Whether taking into account the young people who will come to camp by the hundreds in the next few months, or simply considering the one obnoxious, rebellious, partying kid whose heart is ready to receive a message of hope and love. I'm convinced the world needs Camp Gilead now more than ever.

My wife Penny and I feel a strong connection to Camp Gilead, primarily because she grew up in Wilson Creek, Wash., where Kimberly Mallory's dad served as a pastor for several years. Small town; small world. Big God.



A little different, from a Mom perspective, but Camp Gilead changed our life in the best way and we wanted to share. Did I hope Camp Gilead would be fun for my kids? Yes. Did I hope Camp Gilead would bring them closer to God? Yes. Did I hope Camp Gilead would help them practice independence? Yes. Did I expect Camp Gilead to change my child in a way that I am still in awe of? No. Before we get to that part, let's take a step back.

My husband is a firefighter and I work full-time for our local school district. When we have down time, you can find us in the car ferrying kids to and from sports practices, cheering said kids on from the sidelines or adventuring. Each year when it's time to set our family New Year's Resolution, it is always something along the lines of adventuring. In our free time we camp, hike, boat, crab, fish, travel and experience all the beauty of world. When summer rolled around last year, we had a few weeks that both of us had to work so we started looking into possible summer camp options. Our oldest daughter was an easy sell. She is independent, social and we knew she would flourish in a camp setting. If I am being honest, our middle son, was a worry for me. I didn't know if camp would be a good fit for him. Full transparency, we have described him as feral most of his life. He goes to school, attempts to follow the school regime as best as he can, bounds off the bus, grabs his 'survival backpack' from the house and stays outside until dinner and then back out until dark. When asked about camp he said he wanted to give it a try. But would camp keep him entertained? He lives all of the 'camp things' every day? We went for it. I figured the worst that could happen is he would end up coming home.







I dropped my son off, said my goodbyes and headed down the hill to my car terrified. Why terrified? Well, after meeting his counselor, Kirk, and getting him all settled in, Kirk told him he had free time for about 40 minutes. Free time?!? All I could picture is my son heading into the woods and never being seen or heard from again. So there I am, panicking. In my panic, I head back up the hill to ask Kirk to keep an eye on him make sure he is drinking enough water since he is terrible at drinking enough water and it was going to be hot. I should mention that I am a worrier, but I'm sure that is clear by now. Being a worrier, I worried all week about him. All. Week. I scoured each Camp Gilead social media post for a picture of his existence. Each time I found him in a picture I would let out an audible sigh of relief. Then I started to notice something, not only was he in pictures, he was in a lot of them and he was smiling, joyful even. I felt my anxiety lessen, just a bit.

Let's fast forward to pick-up day. When I picked up my daughter (they went to camp different weeks) I was greeted with a smile and a wave from afar as she headed to breakfast. He bounded down the hill and jumped into my arms, tears in his eyes. Jumped into my arms. My 10-year-old jumped into my arms in front of all of camp. Immediate panic, did he have fun? Tears stung my eyes. My son was exuding joy and was 100% comfortable with it. He was being his authentic, goofy, lovable self in front of a room full of campers. When it was time to leave it took a long time as he exchanged numbers with new friends, took pictures, and was finally ready to go, camp champion flag in hand. Oh, but the surprises didn't stop there. He talked my ear off all the way home about his new goals, how he wanted to grow his connection to God and would I be interested in studying the Bible with him? That night, as I tucked his very tired person into bed under his camp champion flag, I was at peace. I didn't really know what to expect sending my son to camp, but the gift that it produced, is absolutely priceless.

As days turned into weeks and weeks turned into months the changes continued. He is gracious with his siblings and parents, is more connected to friends new and old, he has always been a 'good kid' but he now expresses kindness to others and looks for ways to serve others in ways that he has never done before. And I am not the only one to notice, grandparents and family friends have all commented on the shift.

Was Camp Gilead fun for my kids? Yes. Did Camp Gilead bring them closer to God? Yes. Did Camp Gilead help them practice independence? Yes. Did Camp Gilead change my child in a way that I am still in awe of? Yes. And for that, I am incredibly thankful. Thank you, Camp Gilead, for the massive effort that must go into running camp and thank you for Camp Counselor Kirk for giving my son the best camp experience (and for even remembering to send him something on his birthday!). Camp Gilead, you have a good thing going. My kids are both on a countdown to return to camp and our youngest, is looking forward to his first camp experience this summer. Mendi Everett – Cultivating A Meaningful Prayer Life








This is Camp Gilead Written by Forrest Johnson

Camp Director circa 1969

In 1948, Elma Faul looked over her land. She saw 26 acres of brush and blackberry vines, chickens scratching in front of the bunkhouse, a leftover from some previous sawmill. And she saw something more -- the possibility of a church camp. This vision took hold, grew, became an urgent desire to see the possibility become reality.

In 1969, over 2500 people, kids and grownups took part in the camp programs. Looking around now at the buildings, the pool, the tennis courts and grounds, it's difficult to imagine how it began. Or that Mrs. Faul would have a hard time giving this land to whichever Baptist church would develop it. She was turned down again and again before she approached Forrest Johnson of Tabernacle Baptist Church in Seattle. (He was the 19th or 20th pastor she had contacted! Ed.) He needed no persuasion to be sold on it. He and others explored through briars and nettles. They found the natural amphitheater which became in their eyes, as it is now in fact, the Victory Circle, where fireside services are held. They discovered three springs, a plentiful supply of pure water for the kitchen, dormitories, swimming pool and fountain. There was no doubt in their minds that this was a wonderful opportunity.



Pastor Johnson urged immediate acceptance of Mrs. Faul's proposal. The trustees were more reluctant, seeing obstacles as well as potential. Mr. Lyman Black, chairman of the trustees, was most hesitant, doubting whether a church of this size could be capable of developing such a project. When the matter came before the church membership for a vote, nearly 3/4ths voted in favor for it. Within 3 days, Mr. Black gave a check for \$1000 to the camp fund, and continued to actively support it.

Then the work began. Every Saturday, a crew of 8 or 10 or sometimes as many as 20 men went out. In the beginning, men like Weldon Gwinn, Dave Schwitters, Ralph Kono and Art Heisler worked with bulldozers, clearing and leveling. They planned and directed the layout of the work, spending nearly as much time at camp as their own jobs. Through the years there has been a solid core of those who believe in the camp outreach and prove it by their willingness to do what must be done -- the big jobs, the nuisance jobs, the dirty jobs, the exasperating jobs. There are women who stand out as faithful in the necessary work of staffing the kitchen, scrubbing and painting and mending. Women like Mary Johnson, Emma Heisler, Erma Swanson, Lucille Nilsby and Gwen Jerome. Women who count it as much a privilege as a duty to offer their services.



But the real story is not in the buildings and grounds. It is in the fruit of the Holy Spirit's operation. This is very difficult, if not impossible for humans to measure. And yet, there is ample evidence that He is operating in people's lives. There is **Polly Strong**, youth director at TAB for 5 years. Through her ministry at camp, she felt the Lord directing her to Africa, where she is still engaged in a similar ministry. There is **Mavis Buck** who was greatly influenced by things she heard at camp to give her life to the Lord. She is now on the mission field to Brazil. There are counselors whose lives have literally been changed. Some have changed their majors to Christian Ministries because they have discovered their own vision while working with kids at camp. Others have earnestly decided to find God's plan for their future.

Camp Gilead is called "Hill of Witness." A vision began it. A vision developed it, sustains it. That vision is to present Jesus Christ --so that kids will be saved, that lives will be changed, that everyone involved in the program will experience the Holy Spirit's design.


