



What is Camp Gilead? JACK MOYER

I'm often asked about the history and ownership of Camp Gilead. Many are surprised to find out that we are more than just a summer camp! Camp Gilead began in 1948 as a ministry of Tabernacle Baptist Church, when they were gifted the property near Carnation. The church members began traveling out from Seattle on a regular basis to start the work of converting existing buildings into housing, building new buildings such as the chapel and dining hall, and pushing back the everencroaching blackberry bushes. This quick overview is certainly a simplification of a lot of labor! I like to say that the folks from Tabernacle utilized "recycling and repurposing" long before it became the trend it is today. Many of the buildings that serve us today are a result of the reuse of beams and timbers from other buildings in the Snoqualmie Valley, and natural logs from the property itself.

Painting Details In the early 1970's the camp ministry had grown to more than one church could manage. At the same time, a group of churches had been renting Camp Gilead for their summer camps, and talks between the two resulted in a merger, and the "Gilead Baptist Camp Association" was born.



The Gilead Baptist Camp Association (Camp Gilead) is a non-profit ministry, currently made up of 22 voting member churches. The primary goal is reaching and discipling young people for Christ in the unique setting that is Christian camping. The Association has a board of trustees, drawn from those churches, that assists in the overall direction of Camp Gilead.

Camp Gilead operates in a year-round capacity, and while the summer camp ministry IS what we are most known for, in the non-summer months, weekend retreats occur on most Fridays and Saturdays. Some of those retreats are sponsored and directed by the Camp Gilead team such as the Men's and Women's retreats, or the Mother/Daughter and Father/ Son weekends. We also host churches and Christian ministries, providing the facilities, food service, and general assistance as needed, while they lead their retreat program.



We are thankful for the many years of ministry that the Lord has allowed here, and I would ask that as you think of Camp Gilead, you would ask Him for His continued hand of blessing in sharing the Good News of Jesus.



SPEAKER SPOTLIGHT MOUNTAINS AND VALLEYS

Si, and was reminded of the first time that I agreed to accompany my bride on a mountain hike. I didn't really want to go, but as a newlywed, I figured it would be good "dying to yourself" training. Spoiler alert: I wasn't wrong.

The hike started well enough, but it didn't take long for me to realize that I was in for more than I'd bargained. Before long, I was sweating and my legs were burning, but that was just the beginning; I started catching spiderwebs with my face, and all manner of flesh-eating insects sought to nibble me to death. I don't mind so much being in nature, but when nature gets on me, that's when I start getting grumpy. I began a how-much-longer-is-this-gonnatake-and-why-are-we-doing-this-anyway whine that persisted on-and-off for most of the three-hour hike up that tree-covered rock. How my wife put up with me, I'll never know. I think the only reason that she didn't pitch me off the trail was that she was too busy laughing at the sight of me aggressively waving a stick in front of my face for several hours and carrying on like Daffy Duck whenever I caught another web with my face. (1 Kings 18-19). It's where His power is made perfect in our weakness (2 Corinthians 12:9; 2 Corinthians 4).

So, as you go through the valley, remember James 1:2-4 and consider it all joy, because the summit is just ahead (Luke 21:28).


WOMEN'S RETREAT March 17-18



ONCE UPON A WARDROBE

Synopsis

Megs Devonshire is a college student at Oxford during the 1950's. Her little brother George has a heart condition, and he wants to know the origin of the story that has captured his imagination more than anything. How did Narnia begin? The analytical Megs gathers her courage to ask Professor C.S. Lewis this question, which starts a journey she could have never expected. As Mr. Lewis answers her question with stories of his life, Megs learns how things unseen are just as important as the tangible.

Review

It is evident when reading this work that Patti Callahan is a gifted author as her poetic style quickly draws readers into the story and clearly conveys emotion as well as fact. I appreciate the care she took to tell C.S. Lewis' life story from a new and refreshing perspective. This story, while being a work of fiction, contains true events from C.S. Lewis's life and would be an excellent introduction to the world of biographies. Inside the pages of this story, I found myself joyously agreeing with the points made of why fiction is important and worth reading. Overall, Once Upon a Wardrobe is a well written and thoroughly enjoyable book, especially for fans of Narnia and C.S. Lewis.

Positive Themes

- Love and loyalty. In both Megs' and Mr. Lewis' life, these traits are held in high esteem.
- Benefits of reading, particularly fiction and fantasy.
- Work-life balance as Megs studies hard while also prioritizing her family in pursuit of the answer to George's last wish.

Potential Concerns

- Mentions of both world wars.
 Parental discretion recommended for younger children.
- Terminal illness of a child. The struggle and grief of a child's illness could be a sensitive subject for some families.
- Megs falls in love. Light romance in the second half of the book.



However, I know the paths the Lord takes us on are not only best for his Kingdom, but are incredibly

Since my time at Camp Gilead in 2013, the Lord has led me to various ministry positions, now culminating in my work as a fund development rep for StoryRunners, a missions organization that starts church planting movements among unreached people groups in oral cultures. StoryRunners works with local speakers through a four-week residence workshop, called a school of storying, to develop a set of 42 oral Bible stories into their heart language. Participants can then utilize these stories for evangelism, discipleship and eventual church planting, and are equipped to do so through church planting training during the school of storying. In oral cultures, oral Bible stories are an extremely effective tool for ministry that sidesteps the challenges of literacy. My passion is to introduce people to this wonderful ministry, and help create partnerships that will lead to full funding for its mission, while presenting opportunities for God's people to be involved in God's work.

In March, I had the privilege to be able to observe a school of storying in Tanzania, as StoryRunners worked with members of the Maasai people group to develop our story set (called the Promise) into the language. The project was an absolute dream, and it ended with a completed story set, and 87 new believers! The participants were extremely eager to share their faith in the form of the developed oral Bible stories, and just now we have more StoryRunners staff back in Tanzania to deliver additional church planting training to the 20 participants in the project. They hope to start 3 oral Bible story groups each by the end of the year, with the goal that these groups will become planted churches in their communities.




