In 2020, Camp Gilead did not hold any traditional summer programs. We ran a Summer Challenge, and over 500 people across the country and world participated virtually, in some way, to read through the book of Mark, memorize Scripture and dive into the life of Jesus. Staff that had been hired for the summer also met virtually each week for encouragement. It wasn't the same as being together, but we were thankful to see faces of good friends that we missed so much. The summer was so very different, extremely challenging at times, but God worked and sustained through it all. He is GOOD.

In 2021, we were ecstatic to bring back summer programs in the form of day camps, for kids Kindergarten through 8th grade. It was a challenge to completely revamp what we were used to, but campers and staff were back, and God blessed those efforts. We continued with our theme, "All Aboard – A Journey through the life of Christ" and introduced Gus and Gwen (the well-loved camp puppets) to campers in our daily chapels. The gospel went out, the sounds of campers laughing and playing returned to Gilead and we were so thankful for the opportunity to serve families, staff, and campers at camp. The summer was exhausting and rewarding, required much flexibility and grace, but God was working, we were learning, and He reminded us over and over, that He is sovereign over it all.



This summer, 2022, we were finally able to hold resident (overnight) camps, as well as day camps. The biggest challenge we faced was hiring enough staff for the campers that were registering for camp. Families were eager to get their kids back into the swing of things and excited about all that Gilead was offering. Throughout the spring and even summer months, God continued to provide exactly what we needed at just the right time.




A huge part of our resident summer camp week, is our chapels. Over and over, campers share how their favorite part of the day is time spent in chapel. Singing songs, hearing from funny camp characters, finding out which team is in first place (the team that wins, is the team that says the most verses!) and of course, our chapel speaker. We were so blessed this year by a lineup of incredible camp speakers. Each of them shared from God's Word in a way that engaged the campers, challenged them, met them where they were at and showed them who they are in Christ. There was a lot of laughter, a few tears, and some wrestling with the truth of Scripture, the conviction of sin and the desire to repent and turn to Jesus.

As a former camp counselor, a mom of staffers, a mom of day campers and resident campers, AND the program director, I have the opportunity to see camp from a range of perspectives. I watched as our camp staff worked so selflessly with their campers, loved on them, shared Jesus and endured much, under the title of "camp staff." They served meals, cleaned dishes, took out garbage, attended to medical needs, listened as they shared the burdens of their heart, sang with them, showed them new activities and were the hands and feet of Jesus.

As a camper parent, I packed my kids each week to spend a week with a camp counselor that I was trusting with my greatest treasures. I prayed with them as they left our home and prayed for their hearts to be tender to the chapel messages and be kind to their cabinmates. I had the unique experience of watching my kids' interaction each day of summer camp, as they made new friends, laughed at Gus and Gwen, and ate more candy than I would typically allow. As they came home, I saw them fall asleep on the couch, exhausted from all that the week had offered. Then, as they woke up, I listened to the stories, from their perspective, of cabin adventures, things their counselor said and favorite moments from camp.







As the parent of several staffers this summer, I had the opportunity to watch my kids learn work ethic, conflict resolution, how to deal with failure and success, how to interact with different kinds of people and how to respect authority. These are challenging lessons, and it's not always easy to watch your kids learn and grow in this way.

As the program director, I was able to oversee an ever-changing team of high school and college students, who worked together each week to accomplish the task that God laid before them. I often told them that this is the BEST, HARDEST job you may ever have. God used Camp Gilead to stretch and mold, shape and reshape, challenge and convict, and we are so thankful for the gift of serving in ministry.

God is continuing to write his story in the lives of campers, staff and families and is using Camp Gilead as a part of it. For almost 75 years, since 1948, God has had his hand on these 27 acres in Carnation. He has blessed, he has protected, and he has sustained. As we look back, we can see His fingerprints on our lives, as well as the ministry of Gilead. At times, it is hard to see what He is doing, but we can rest assured that He is GOOD. He is ALWAYS GOOD.





DAY CAMP TESTIMONIES

Mission trip. Battlefield. Frontlines. We don't usually think of these words when we hear of a chance to serve Jesus forty minutes down the road. Many times, these words are associated with "outside the country", "overseas", "long-term". But that's not always the case.

This summer, I had the privilege of serving on the Day Camp staff at Camp Gilead for one week. I got to spend time with two brothers, about 7 and 4 years old. Jacob* was the older boy. After almost every Bible lesson during chapel time, he would come up to me and declare something like "I don't think Jesus is real." Or, after the Bible lesson on the crucifixion, "I've seen that before. It's scary." Each of those times, I got to speak truth into his life.

"We don't have to be scared of that, Jacob*, because Jesus took care of it for us."

"Jesus is real, Jacob*. We know that because the Bible tells us and the Bible is always true."



One afternoon, both boys sat down with me after Pops Inn. I asked them, "Why do you think Jesus isn't real?" Jacob answered, "Because in China, they tell us, 'Once upon a time, Jesus was here. It's just a story. It's not real.'"

You see, both campers are from China. They were just here for the summer. They had never heard that what Jesus did for us really happened, they had never owned a Bible or known that God's Word is true. It blows my mind to think that God brought these two boys halfway around the world, to the United States, to Washington state, to a camp called Camp Gilead—so that they could hear that Jesus is real and that He died for them.

Serving at Camp Gilead is a mission trip. It is a battlefield. It is the frontlines. God is bringing kids from all over Washington state, from around the country, even from around the world to hear the truth about Who He is. He's bringing kids who have previously never seen a Bible. He's bringing kids from broken homes. He's bringing kids who need discipling. He's bringing kids who are longing to know who He is. He's looking for laborers to come participate in His harvest. And when you say "yes", He will use you in more ways than you could ever imagine.

DAY CAMP TESTIMONIES

This year I volunteered to serve on staff for Day Camp #3 at Camp Gilead. This was my first time ever doing anything with Gilead, besides attending the occasional event. I originally had no intent to go to this camp either. My church advertised that they were looking for volunteers to help lead this day camp, but I never had the urge to sign up. Two or three days before the camp started, I got a call saying that they were short one guy leader, and I was asked if I would be interested in filling the spot. The expectations and schedule for the week were explained to me, and after talking it over with my parents, I agreed. In many ways, the camp went as I expected: some kids were a breeze, some were a handful. I had some good conversations with kids who were genuinely interested in what the Bible had to say, others had no interest at all. Some days my co-leader and I had things under control, and other times it seemed everyone in my group all ran in a different direction at the same time. I think it was an eye-opening experience for me in a way I didn't realize. Going into it, I knew I might have the opportunity to share the gospel with some of the kids, and if the Lord saw fit, I might be blessed with leading someone to Christ. However, like I said earlier, while I did have some great conversations with some of them, I also began to realize how much I didn't know about God myself.



I think I first realized this when I had a conversation with a camper about the Trinity. He wanted to know how Jesus could be God and die on the cross, while at the same time be forsaken by God (Mark 15:34). I proceeded to explain the Trinity, and how Jesus is God the Son, and while he was on the cross, God the Father turned his face away from his Son. It was while I was explaining the Trinity to him, that I realized how absurd it sounded. The more I tried to explain it, the more desperate I became to explain it correctly. I finally had to close with "we as humans can't fully understand who God is."

While my belief in this theology was not shaken, it reminded me in a way I've never thought of before how ignorant we are in the ways of God. I was so familiar with this doctrine, that I had never stopped to look at it with new eyes, and it made me realize just how inconceivable God is to us. I am thankful for my experience at Camp Gilead not only for the ministry opportunity, but also for the ways it benefited my own walk with Christ. I went into it thinking I was going to make an impact on others, and God used it as a teaching moment for my own spiritual benefit. I highly recommend serving at Camp Gilead, and I would definitely do it again.

DAY CAMP TESTIMONIES

One thing that I got to see during my week as a day camp counselor was the importance and efficacy of planting seeds. My perspective coming into camp was that I might be there for the kids, but the short time we had together wouldn't really allow for true change in their lives. My fellow leader and I were given quite the bunch of day campers to wrangle, and it seemed like our primary focus should be to keep them all safe and having fun: that took enough effort as it was!



I was surprised and happy when a couple of campers were excited to learn verses with me, but there was one camper who really caught my attention. This camper dragged her feet at activities and seemed to do the exact opposite of what was instructed. I was certain she wasn't paying any attention during chapel. However, after chapel towards the end of the week, she started asking questions about whether God loves everyone, even bad people, and whether He still loves her when she does bad things. We were able to have a really good conversation and at the end she asked to pray with me. I later find out that this camper came from a difficult situation at home and that she had come to camp under her grandparents' influence. The conversations we got to have with her might have been some of the first ones she had about God.



So even though one week is a short time to be with a group of campers and may not allow for the consistency that is ideal for spiritual growth, I learned not to discount the opportunities it does afford to plant seeds and provoke questions.
